
Where does our income come from?

Pledges

Pledge income is made up of all payments made toward a recorded pledge to the church in the calendar year. Saint Paul's goal in 2024 is 100% participation from participating families. No gift is too big or too small.

Endowment Fund

The Saint Paul's Parish Endowment is governed by an endowment board elected by the vestry. The current automatic annual distribution equation is 3.5% of a 3 year rolling average of income.

One-Time Gifts includes undesignated plate offerings, one-time online gifts, and other independent, undesignated giving throughout the year.

Other

Other Income includes school maintenance reimbursements, the lease of the Jefferson plot, Amazon Smile benefits, annual income from the Badger and Genovese Trusts, and interest income from our accounts.

Worship

In the last year, we've increased worship attendance by 10% and baptized 9 children. We have also reinvigorated our music ministry with a new choir director, increased choir participation, and introduced beautiful and diverse music offerings. We hosted a theologian-in-residence for Holy Week, started a successful community worship and fellowship program through Holy Hikes, and led worship monthly at The Delaney for any resident wanting to join us.

Formation


We've improved our Christian Education across all age groups this year, increasing both availability and attendance. Some of the highlights include a new initiative just for 5th and 6th graders and our weekly offerings of bible study, contemplative prayer, and Benedictine spirituality. Our fall Sunday adult series blends expert teaching in a podcast format with real-time, in-person conversation and connection to deepen our understanding of the Scriptures.

Outreach


This year alone, our congregation has supported 10 different local organizations, as well as families within our church and school and beyond. Through donations of both finances and time we fulfilled their needs and we fulfilled our own need to reach out to our wider community with love and support. We also gathered over 70 people together one evening to pack enough food for 21,000 meals for children and families in need through Kids Against Hunger, a ministry that serves communities all over the world.

Congregational Care

Congregational Care consists of both fellowship and our pastoral care efforts. Each week, our altar guild rearranges our altar flowers into smaller vases and pairs them with notes made by our Saint Paul's School students to deliver to those who are ill, home-bound, or celebrating a milestone like a birthday, new baby, or anniversary. We enjoy time together and strengthen our community bonds at events like our Parish Picnic, Trunk or Treat, Blessing of the Animals, and Rally Day. And we made dozens of home visits, hospital calls, and notes in the mail to help our parish feel connected and cared for. We look forward to launching new initiatives in 2024 to foster more connection and care within our parish family.
